"Call for Lesson Plans and Inspirational Stories of Peace Makers"

- Submissions should be a maximum of **3** pages (about 750 words) of theoretical framework and instruction (supplemental materials i.e., pictures, games, photos, charts, etc. can be additional),
- Age levels can be from primary to high school and lessons can have age “ranges” i.e., 8 – 12 years of age,
- Lesson plans should be as practical as possible. Think about how a teacher/ instructor/ parent could easily read and understand the material. One particular way of being practical is showing how materials can be integrated OR “infused” into lesson plans and/ or curricula that already exists or has been prepared.
- Regional and/ or current issues and experiences are desired whether in lesson plan or story form. We hope to inform others of successes and challenges to being the peace for which we hope. Sharing stories and experiences can be a powerful demonstration of how things happen and can work and even how they can fail, yet provide valuable learning experiences. Some examples may include stories of protest and movements that challenge injustice, reactions/ responses of teachers and students in teaching/ learning about violence and peace, etc.

BARCELONA Conference Postponed, Smaller Meeting Planned in Tirana

The conference in Barcelona on *Challenges to Peace Education* planned in cooperation with the *Fundacion Cultura de Paz* (October 20-24, 2004) has been postponed; instead a smaller gathering of peace educators will take place (with the same dates) in Tirana, Albania. The topic in Tirana will be *Developing Democracy Through Peace Education: Educating Toward a World Without Fear*. The meeting, attended by our International Advisory Committee and Board of Directors, will see the launch of our new publication, *Peace Lessons*. It will bring together practitioners and ministers of education to work on guidelines for integrating peace education into national systems. We will also hear experiences from our successful pilot partnership with the UN DDA in Peru, Niger, Cambodia and Albania.

This adds to our collection of peace education training materials that we already have translated in Arabic, Russian and Albanian in the hope of reaching countless teachers and students across the globe.

GCPE partners make the New York Times!

On July 28, Adina Shapiro and Ghassan Abdullah, Co-Directors of the Middle East Children's Network (MECA) were featured in the Education section in an article entitled, "Need for Mideast Reconciliation Draws Teachers Across a Divide." Mr. Abdullah and Ms. Shapiro founded the Middle East Children's Association which is dedicated to promoting coexistence through education. The annual conference held in July in Ramallah and Tel Aviv was attended by its 300 member teachers and discussions centered primarily on the teachers need "to rescue an entire generation of Palestinian children." The article further mentioned that "teacher after teacher offered tips on curriculums that might still instill a healthier sense of Palestinian culture than the explosive belt and AK-47." Various projects were proposed, and one such initiative used the olive tree as a means of teaching about economics, agriculture and art.

I. GCPE NEWS from the FIELD

ALBANIA

Elton Skendaj reports: "I am happy to tell you about a partnership that our Peace and Disarmament Education project has entered into with the Institute for Pedagogical Studies (ISP), the institute responsible for the national curricula in Albania. ISP, with the approval of the Ministry of Education and Science, has taken on the initiative to prepare a teacher's guide for cross and extracurricular activities in schools serving teachers of all levels in the pre-university education. ISP asked for collaboration from various programs in the country including our Peace Education Project. About 10 pages in this guide will be devoted to peace and disarmament education including citations of our online resources.

BRAZIL

Our GCPE partner, Olivia Martin writes from Sao Paulo about current projects: “I just returned from Local JAM, a week-long retreat with young activists from various Brazilian states and Latin American countries. Local JAM is a project of the Global Youth Action Network and is linked to GCPE goals of non-formal peace education in action. The encounter celebrated diversity as well as increased visibility of the youth movement.

Participants were amazing in their engagement, commitment and sense of civic responsibility. The scope and quality of their projects was inspiring and impressive, ranging from work with the black movement of Brazil, to environmental education, violence prevention, sex and drugs education, women rights groups, recycling and work with street children, and social entrepreneurship with a focus on income generation and capacity building trainings for youth with a positive social impact.

Written and oral evaluations showed almost every participant was transformed after the JAM on a personal level, with a broader and deeper understanding of their interconnectedness. After having explored their own prejudices, fears and visions for the future, they were inspired by promising new partnerships and friendships, new skills and access to new resources. Over 20 new collaborative projects resulted from this first meeting.

Local JAM aims to replicate its work in every Brazilian state and then across Latin America with preparations underway for the second JAM in North East Brazil.

In addition, I work with Redepaz – Globalnet organizing an international Culture of Peace meeting in Ghana, Africa. This meeting, officially supported by the Hague Appeal for Peace and linked with the UN Department of Children and Armed Conflict, aims to help set up a Peace Center for children and youth in Aburi, Ghana.

CAMBODIA

Thavory Huot reports from the field: “We believe the achievements of our Peace and Disarmament Project over the past year and a half have been a result of a strong sense of pride within our team plus collaboration between NGOs and the Ministry of Education.”

They began the project in Phnom Penh with a solid framework and before implementing it the WGWR PE team maintained close interaction with members of the local community, schools, and ministries in order to gather information related to their attitude towards peace and disarmament, weapons situation and teaching. Workshops were also conducted at the provincial level in order to facilitate the development of the peace curriculum. An in-depth analysis was also done regarding the existing national curriculum on morality and citizenship along with receiving feedback from the teachers. According to Huot, all of these aspects have been necessary for the support and sustainability of the project.

“On June 1, International Children’s Day, Cambodian national TV broadcast a student Peace Talk Program, an activity organized by our PE team. Also, everywhere we go we can see WGWR PE stickers at cars and motorbikes! The PE team and myself are proud of the project and these deeds I think reflect the sustainability of the project!”

COLOMBIA

From June 17-20, three programs were conducted by Educators for Peace in different parts of the world: a seminar in Argentina, a Peace Education course in Brazil and proposal to work cooperatively with Ann Manson in Australia. We are also creating a *Tool Box For Peace Education* with various peace education experiences and lessons for our teachers.

On July 15, Amada Benavides, Director of Fundacion Escuelas de Paz, coordinated the 4th Encounter of Civil Society for an Agenda for Peace to collectively construct proposals for policy makers to respect human rights and contribute to their conceptualization throughout all legal documents. Civil society members gathered to discuss themes of peace and human rights and how to encourage governments to support the movement.

INDIA

Leban Serto writes: "I prepared a power point presentation on the Nobel Laureate Daw Aung San Suu Kyi as an integral part of our upcoming teacher training workshops and our program for the Global Peace Education Campaign. We hope to reach teachers and other civil society members in our region of NE India (Imphal). It is about 100 km from the Myanmar border.

We have used excerpts from the HAP audio *Bye Bye War*. We would also like to translate this presentation into other local languages here to have greater reach. We dedicate this material for all those who are working to promote Peace Education and especially for the people of Burma (Myanmar) in their longing for Peace and Democracy to come into their lives."

ISRAEL

Reports on Israel's activities for the Geneva Initiative for June show emphasis on education: Daniel Levy, Geneva Initiative Israel, reports: "Educational activities to promote the GI continue apace, with enhanced efforts focused on specific target communities, Russian speakers and the Israeli-Arab public in this respect. A teacher training program to conduct peace education in schools, with an emphasis on the Geneva Initiative (GI) principles, is now in full swing.

It is our hope that further and significant revisions will be made to the separation barrier and in particular would like to draw attention to current construction in the A-Ram area, which in addition to its other disruptive effects is likely to further restrict the ability to hold joint Israeli-Palestinian meetings. On this theme the GI educational tours to view the Jerusalem separation barrier route vs. the proposed Geneva borders in Jerusalem are proving to be a popular and effective educational tool."

JORDAN

Under the patronage of Her Majesty Queen Noor Al Hussein, The Performing Arts Center of The Noor Al Hussein Foundation held the 24th annual Arab Children Congress, from the 19th -25th of July, 2004 entitled *My Culture... My Identity*. The Performing Arts Center is a group of 11 young actors and dancers who represent Jordan in the “Contacting the World Theatre Project” which is part of the British Council Connecting Futures initiative. The program aims to build mutual understanding, learning and respect between young people with different cultural backgrounds in the UK and other countries.

The 24th Arab Children Congress focused on the topics of Heritage and Modernity, Cultural Elements that form the National Identity and the role of International Cultural cooperation in the era of globalization. Based on a recommendation in the previous Congress, the 24th ACC hosted youth ages 14-16 gathered from 20 Arab and European countries, in order to encourage interaction with Arab youth and to share the rich heritage and culture of the Arab world. The conference thereby aimed for youth from different nations to contribute towards bridging cultures, overcoming stereotypes, raise awareness of democratic principles and human rights, promoting values of peace, cooperation and tolerance and most of all empower participating youth from various countries to be active advocates for peace, human rights and cross cultural understanding.

USA

On July 14, Kathleen Tordini gave a live teleconference to the DMZ conference in South Korea gathered on the occasion of "Transforming the DMZ into A Peace and Nature Sanctuary." Kathleen addressed GCPE goals, achievements and lessons to offer support and guidance for the incredible transformation of their region. “It is inspiring to see efforts such as this one where safe spaces can bridge nations, unite people and build understanding.”

Seung-ho Lee, President, The DMZ Forum, writes: “The Gyeonggi Province is preparing a grand Peace Festival in the summer of 2005 which hopes to be an extension of the Hague Appeal for Peace 1999 conference. We hope that HAP will be a major part of this Peace Festival, the biggest peace initiative done by Korean government with a lot of publicity.”

Betty Reardon reports great news from Teachers College, Columbia University Peace Education Center: “I am very happy, indeed, to inform you that permission has been granted and the formal search for a well qualified peace educator will begin in the fall. Should you know of good candidates from any part of the world, please bring this search to their attention. Those of you who are going to participate in the meeting of the Peace Education Commission of the International Peace Research Association might inform the experienced university level peace educators there of this search.”
